YM: What do you enjoy most about teaching?

SJ: “. . . getting to build relationships with my students and their families. As a private music teacher, I often get to work with my students for many years and watch the growth that happens. It's exciting and so rewarding!”

YM: Do you have any special stories to share?

SJ: “. . . my favorite story is from many years ago, when I directed the choir at a private school. I remember one boy was very enthusiastic, but really struggled to sing on key. Other kids teased him and told him to just be quiet and mouth the words. But, I told him to keep singing and worked with him after class for several weeks. He was diligent, kept working hard, and by the end of the semester, got a solo in the final choir performance of the year.”

YM: Do you have any advice for beginners?

Instrument: Piano

"I would choose to play the violin because I feel that the sound of a violin can be phrased in a way where it sounds like singing. The violin is also easy to carry around and you only have to worry about one line of music instead of two hands!"

1811-1886 Franz Liszt

Hungarian composer, virtuoso pianist, and teacher of the Romantic Era

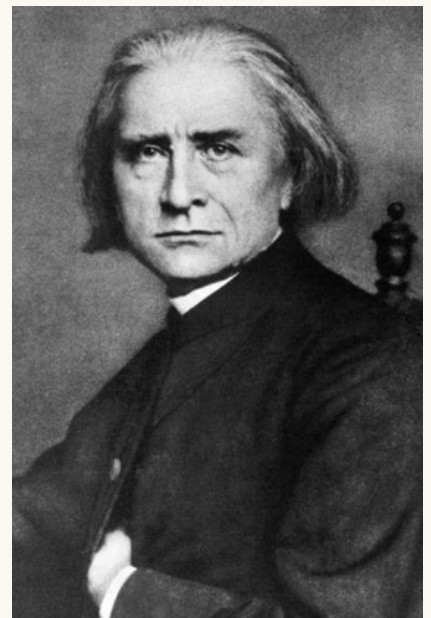
At a young age, Liszt was exposed to music from his father. He began learning piano at age seven, composing at age eight, and performing in concerts at age nine, which were a great success.

After his father's death in 1827, Liszt moved to Paris, gave up touring, and began teaching piano and composition. Five years passed before he returned to performing. Liszt was inspired by Niccolò Paganini, often considered the greatest violin virtuoso of all time, and he was determined to be as brilliant on piano as Paganini was on the violin.

He continued to tour Europe for years, enjoying hysterical receptions everywhere he went; the crowd would go wild when he performed, due to both his playing and mesmeric stage presence.

In his later years, Liszt focused more on composition and teaching, but his legacy lives on as one of the greatest pianists of all time.

Famous compositions: La Campanella, Transcendental Études, Liebesträume, Hungarian Rhapsodies
